Skills Training: Accredited “Cashier & Merchandising” Skills Training is finally here!

A long-awaited dream at Lesedi has been realised – on 1 March, beneficiaries began their accredited 6-week Cashier & Merchandising course.

The course will be divided into two phases. In phase one (two weeks long), candidates will be taught theory in class. The remaining four weeks of phase two will be dedicated to practical exposure – candidates will be sent to different work places to put into practice what they learnt in class.

It cannot be over-emphasised that the positive attitude and work ethic are the best-selling proposition to any potential employer – we see so much passion and hunger for employment!

A Partnership to Change Lives in Mabopane

Lesedi has finally sealed a practical placement with Big Save in Mabopane! "Big Save is always prepared to collaborate with businesses in our surroundings to make Mabopane a better place", said Mr Tony Ferreira, one of the managers at Big Save.

The practical placement agreement affords 13 Cashier & Merchandising learners from Lesedi an opportunity to acquire 20 days work experience in a retail environment. Among other things, learners will assist with packing behind the tills, packing the stock in the shelves and some will assist in the liquor store. "All competent and hard-working learners will be compensated wherever necessary and may eventually be employed", added Mr Tony.

A Special Event: Lebone la Bokamoso (Light for the Future)

On 24 March, our community centre hosted an interactive information event aimed at empowering teen-moms, the disabled, the vulnerable ladies from our Bokamoso Project, and senior citizens through Pro-Active Information and Physical Education.

Motivational speaker Lesego Modipa (former LRC president of Setumo-Khiba) shared on God's presence in trying times and the pride of motherhood. Our teen-mom coordinator Kamogelo Mophuting facilitated a discussion on TB and HIV/AIDS, and our social auxiliary worker Lydia Mathebe facilitated a human rights workshop with the learners from different schools. Our SAWs Monica Rihlamvu and Ntswaki Monyoko performed a TB screening, to assist in referring those who might be suffering from TB to nearby clinics.

It was wonderful to see the active participation from those who attended! We were also blessed with four powerful beneficiary testimonies, thanking Lesedi La Batho and sharing how we showed them the light!



A special few of our beneficiaries' success stories...

Substance Abuse

Mabopane has a widespread problem with abuse of the addictive drug Nyaope.

Recently, a young boy passed on from overdose. The community was alarmed and concerned by the sudden death of their friend, and is realising the impact of this destructive drug.

We opened a support group, facilitated by our social auxiliary worker Freeda. Drug abusers can freely talk about their drug-related problems, their will to quit, and about finding help and rehabilitation centres.

Five boys attended the sessions. They enquired with Black Like Me social workers about rehab centres, who promised to help if they attend the counselling sessions at Lesedi first. They attended every single one.

Lesedi donated clothing to the boys so they don't look different to others at the rehab centre, and food parcels to help their families. All five boys are going to rehab before the end of March. We hope to see them soon, clean and ready to take on the world!




Thank-You from Matshidiso Pokwane, a Teenage Mother

26-year-old Solane Mona is a mother of two. Solane was disabled in an incident a few years back. She stays with her family, and isn't receiving a disability grant. After one of our social auxiliary workers conducted one-on-one sessions with her, she started attending disability support groups at our community centre. At first, she was not confident enough to share her personal stories, but over time she has opened up to her journey. With the help of Lesedi la Batho, Solane got a learnership from Afrit Skills College, and she receives a stipend from the college every month.
